U.S. Potato Growers Applaud FCC's Decision to Block Encroachment on GPS

Washington, D.C. – The following statement is from Steve Crane, President of the National Potato Council (NPC) and owner of Crane Brothers, Inc., a potato growing operation in Exeter, Maine, on yesterday's announcement that the Federal Communications Commission has blocked LightSquared's proposed nationwide wireless network:

"National Potato Council and its industry allies support the expansion and availability of low-cost rural broadband service, but not at the expense of the high-precision Global Positioning System (GPS) technologies relied upon by America's farmers. As such, NPC is pleased that the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has moved to block LightSquared's planned nationwide rural wireless network over concerns that it cannot coexist with existing global positioning systems.

"Increased broadband access will drive improvements in economic development, education and health services in rural America. NPC and its partners will continue to work with the FCC to ensure that accurate GPS technology will continue to be available for precision agriculture while supporting for the expansion of broadband access to benefit all of rural America."
