Grower Leader 4th generation grower, Bender Potatoes Chambersburg, Pennsylvania

Bryan Bender is 39 years old and is the 4th generation grower of Bender Potatoes. Bender Potatoes grow 140 acres of round white potatoes in Chambersburg, PA on 500 acres of farmland. Bender Potatoes grow 70 acres of Atlantic and Snowden for out of the field chipping and 70 acres of Norwis, Reba, and Waneta for table stock. While 30 acres of Waneta are put into storage to be packed and sold on demand, Bryan oversees sales, shipping, and procuring for repacking to provide local customers with year- round supply. They sell to a few local grocery stores and restaurants, but most of the table stock goes to food service distributors. As a small family farm, Bryan is involved in the entire operation but his focus is growing, buying, and selling potatoes.

Bryan also helps manage the everyday activity of 7-10 year-round employees. To help keep his life busy, he and his wife of 13 years, Betsy, have three kids - an 12-year-old son, 9-year-old daughter, and 6-year-old son. As a family they enjoy eating, watching and playing sports, travel and exploring new places, friendships and family. He is a member of a local church, coaches basketball and football, and loves his hometown of Chambersburg.

Owner/ Assistant Manager, Harrison Farms and Brian Harrison Farms

Center, Colorado

Brent Harrison is a potato farmer in southern Colorado. Brent and his Dad Brian Harrison operate a potato and grain operation on 720 acres in the San Luis valley. Brent is a 4th generation potato farmer growing mainly russet varieties due to rocky soil. As a kid he spent most of his time on the farm or in the mountains. At a young age he was involved in tillage work, loading bulk trucks, and spreading dry fertilizers. Brent graduated high school in 2017 and attended CSU for one semester then transferring to Adams State University that spring to be closer to the farm. He attended Adams state from spring 2018-fall 2021 studying Ag. Business. At Adams state Brent was the treasurer of the Ag. Business club. In the fall of 2021 he withdrew from school during harvest to take more of a managerial role on the farm.

Brent started Harrison Farms in the spring of 2022. He grows potatoes and grains with his father owned of Brain Harrison farms. The operation grows 480-600 acres of potatoes depending on yearly rotations. The irrigation used on the farm is center pivots on quarter sections of land. Russet potatoes are rotated on a 2:1 year rotation with Coors barley or cover crops depending on soil health. Brent will also rotate fields in to 5-year periods of grass or alpha with his cousin Todd Harrison owner of quarter more farms and part owner of quarter moon hay company. Brent also helps his Brian Harrison farms grow seed potatoes for the farm they plan on expanding in the seed market with new rule seed certification standards on the horizon in Colorado.

Outside of the farm Brent enjoys anything outdoors. His favorite things to do in his spare time is to hunt, ice fish, and fly fish! As a young farmer Brent is excited for any opportunity to network and learn more from other farmers.

Together with their father, Damon and 3 of his siblings manage a fresh pack operation with 2000 acres of potatoes and 700 acres of onions. Damon and one of his brothers manage the farm, while Damon primarily works with the agronomy side of farming, he helps with the technology side.

Del Christensen and Sons has a wide network of customers, potatoes and onions are marketed to grocery stores, and being one of the closest sheds to the ports of Seattle and Tacoma, there are onions and russet potatoes exported to various countries across the Pacific Ocean.

When not farming, Damon enjoys spending time with his kids ranging from 5 to 11 years old. The family enjoys the outdoors and spends several weekends through the year camping and fishing. Damon's family has began an adventure in having horses and starting to raise their own livestock.

Damon is a member of the Government Affairs Committee in the Washington State Potato Commission. He enjoys learning and being an advocate for the industry.

Damon initially attended Rocky Mountain College on a football scholarship, but due to injuries that ended after a season. After attending other universities and meeting his wife, Damon attended the University of Idaho and studied Sustainable Cropping Systems. Drew Thorlund

Farm Labor, Thorlund Brothers Farms Greenville, Michigan

Drew got his associates degree from Montcalm Community College and Michigan State University in Agricultural Operations in 2021. He now works full time on his fourth-generation family farm alongside his father, uncle, and two cousins. On this farm they grow a variety of different crops including: Corn, Wheat, Dry Edible Beans, Soybeans, and potatoes.

Drews has become more and more involved with many operations on this farm every year. His biggest role on the farm is running the sprayer which is used for all the crops on the farm and takes up the majority of his time at work throughout the summer months but he also runs the corn and wheat combine as well as runs a harvester for dry beans. We currently farm about 4000 acres and grow about 950 acres of potatoes a year. We store them in large bins after harvest and start shipping around November and throughout winter until early to middle of June.

Drews farm grows one hundred percent chipping potatoes and ships to a variety of different companies mainly across the east side of the US from Pennsylvania to Florida. Although Drew doesn't do as much on the potato side of the farm operation as his two cousins and uncle, he's always there to drive trucks or run a windrower when the fields are in the worst shape usually later in the year. He also spends a lot of time helping out the crew when its time to start shipping potatoes but prefers to stay in the nice warm combine picking corn.





Dawson Mast

Farmer, Mast Farms Lancaster, Pennsylvania

Dawson Mast is proud to call himself a fourth-generation potato farmer. The family farm is located in Lancaster, Pennsylvania. While they pride themselves in their potato heritage, they also grow pumpkins, strawberries and field crops. In 2022 Dawson purchased the neighboring farm from his grandfather and together they raise cattle on the property.

Vice President, Hemphill Farms Inc Presque Isle, Manie

Garrett is 29 years old, he farms with his father and three brothers in and around Presque Isle, Maine. Hemphill Farms was started in 1920 by Garrett's Great-great Grandfather. As the fifth generation Garrett manages the farms six potato storages and markets the potatoes to over 30 seed customers.

Garrett currently resides in the farms original homestead with his wife Alexandra, 5-year-old daughter and 3-year-old son. They are expecting their third child in May 2024. Garrett enjoys spending time with his family and snowmobiling in the winter when time allows.

Hemphill Farms grows 600 acres of mostly seed and a few processing potatoes. Hemphill's grow mostly Russet Burbank and Caribou Russets; they also grow Atlantic, Lamoka, Snowden and Waneta. Hemphill's sell a majority of their seed to local growers, they also ship seed to Florida, North Carolina and New York. Their processing potatoes are shipped to McCain foods in the neighboring town. In the past decade Hemphill's have increased their acreage dramatically purchasing land and buildings when it becomes available. They currently farm in four towns centered around Presque Isle. Hemphill's recently stopped growing grain to focus on potatoes, as a rotation they now land swap with their cousins who own and operate The Maine Malt House. They utilize 800 acres of Hemphill's farmland to grow Malt Barley and Wheat to be used in beer production in New England.

Garrett attended Northern Maine Community College with a major in diesel hydraulics and a minor in business administration. Garrett is the chairman of the Maine Seed Potato Board. He also serves on the board of the Maine Seed Potato Council, Maine Potato Growers and the Agriculture Bargaining Council.





Jeremy Clark

Farm Manager, CSS Farms Bliss, New York

Jeremy Clark is 45 years old and is the Farm Manager for CSS Farms in Bliss, New York. CSS Farms operates 17 farms in 10 states growing seed, chip, and specialty potatoes. This location grows over 4,000 acres of chip potatoes. There are 7 varieties that are grown here that are stored and shipped for 10-11 months out of the year. Most of the acres grown are sold to regional chip processors in the East. Jeremy manages a team of over 30 year-round employees and more than 100 during peak operating seasons. He oversees all day-to-day potato production activities and farming operations.

Since his promotion to Director in 2017, Jon oversees the operation of over 28,000 acres of a variety of crops, to include about 3,000 acres of russet potatoes for processing. He is involved with whole seed delivery, seed cutting, planting, harvest and storage of all potatoes grown on the farm.

Jon has seven managers/ supervisors that each work in a zone where they manage irrigation, fertilizer, specific departments, planting, and harvest. His team consists of personnel that has farmed for over 20 years to new supervisors right out of college. When Jon is not farming, he likes to spend time with his wife, Amy, of 24 years and their 2 Sons, a 13-year-old, and a 20-year-old in his second year of college. Owner/Member, TRB Dykema LLC Manhattan, Montana
